New York State and New York City Offer Amnesty to Organizations That Advocate for Their Communities But Have Never Registered as Lobbyists

Organizations that spend at least \$5,000 in a calendar year on employee salaries and other expenses associated with lobbying must register and report as a lobbyist and client. Financial penalties for failure to register and report can be substantial. However, in 2016, the State's Joint Commission on Public Ethics ("JCOPE") and City's Lobbying Bureau will offer amnesty to first-time registrants.

Your organization may be required to register and report if it tries to influence:

- the inclusion of funding for themselves or a government program in the state or city budget,
- proposed legislation in the state legislature or City Council, or
- a government agency's generally applicable policies.

How to seek amnesty:

- New York City: Applications for amnesty can be filed Jan. 1 to June 30, 2016, and must describe the organization's lobbying since Jan. 1, 2015. Organizations may, but are not required to, file a notice of intent to seek amnesty now.
- New York State: Applications for amnesty may be filed Jan. 1 to June 30, 2016. An organization seeking amnesty must file all JCOPE reports that it should have filed, and all filing fees it would have been required to pay, back to Jan. 1, 2013.
